

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Aminadab:

From Dissent to Faith The word of God is often spoken of as a two-edged sword.

This image can be used to illustrate the division of the two sides of Lehi's family. The Lamanites and Nephites became divided from one another because of the word of God or more correctly, because of their response to the word of God. The Nephites were originally described as believers in the word of the Lord and the Lamanites were described as those who did not believe. The word of God divided the two sides of this family. They were divided to the blessing of one family and the condemnation of the other.

While the history of these brother nations was often bloody and tragic, at times there were efforts to bridge the gap of difference. When this occurred, it was always the direct result of the influence of the gospel on the hearts of believing people who sought ways to bring blessing to their estranged brethren through the gospel. Such was the motivation for the missionary effort of Lehi and Nephi, the sons of Helaman.

Background

In the years prior to the missionary journey of Nephi and Lehi, the Nephites went through a period of turmoil. Beginning in the 46th year of the reign of the judges, the land was filled with much contention. These difficulties were resolved in time, but even the resulting peace was marred by the activity of a secret combination called the Gadianton robbers. Yet, for a period of time, the church prospered, gaining in members and riches. However, sin and pride entered into the church, and troubles began.

Some church members, those "who professed to belong to the church of God" (Helaman 2:29 RLDS) [Helaman 3:34

LDS], began to persecute other members of the church. Contention simmered for a few years and, finally, in the 54th year of the judges, a split developed in the church. Many of the members became

Yea, we see that whosoever will lav hold upon the word of God which is quick and powerful, which shall divide asunder all the cunning, and the snares, and the wiles of the devil, and lead the man of Christ in a strait and narrow course across that everlasting gulf of misery which is prepared to engulf the wicked, and land their souls, yea, their immortal souls, at the right hand of God, in the kingdom of heaven, to sit down with Abraham, and Isaac, and with Jacob, and with all our holy fathers, to go no more out. (Helaman 2:26 RLDS) [Helaman 3:30 LDS]

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so estranged that they defected into Lamanite lands and joined with the Lamanites. This defection followed sharp disagreements and bloodshed.

The dissenters tried to convince the Lamanites to go to war against the Nephites, but were unsuccessful. Two years later, a second party of dissenters arrived and, together with the Nephite dissenters already in the land,

they convinced the Lamanites to go to war. During this war, the Nephites suffered the loss of many lives and lost all of their cities and property in the land of Zarahemla.

And thus those dissenters of the Nephites, with the help of a numerous army of the Lamanites, had obtained all the possession of the Nephites which was in the land southward. (Helaman 2:40 RLDS) [Helaman 4:8 LDS]

The Nephite armies initiated a slow, painful and costly campaign to recover the lands lost in the unexpected attack. At the same time, a sober sense of reality settled upon the Nephites. They had gradually fallen into a lazy practice of their religion and made many compromises, while ignoring many practical aspects of their faith.

Now this great loss of the Nephites, and the great slaughter which was among them, would not have happened, had it not been for their wickedness and their abomination which was among them; yea, and it was among those also who professed to belong to the church of God: And it was because of the pride of their hearts, because of their exceeding riches, yea, it was because of their oppression to the poor, withholding their food from the hungry, withholding their clothing from the naked, and smiting their humble brethren upon the cheek, making a mock of that which was sacred, denying the spirit of prophecy and of revelation, murdering, plundering, lying, stealing, committing adultery, rising up in great contentions, and deserting away into the land of Nephi, among the Lamanites. (Helaman 2:44,45 RLDS) [Helaman 4:11,12 LDS]

Nephi and his younger brother, Lehi, began to travel throughout the land, preaching repentance among the people in all the cities of the Nephites. The word of God and the recent afflictions of the Nephites stimulated a process of repentance. After preaching



among all the Nephites, the brothers entered the lands of the Lamanites. (Helaman 2:77, 78 RLDS) [Helaman 5:14-16 LDS]

The brothers first preached throughout the land of Zarahemla, which bordered on the land Bountiful. Beyond the land of Zarahemla lay the land of Nephi. The sons of Helaman preached powerfully among the Lamanites and dissenters with much authority and great success in Zarahemla.

Nephi and Lehi then crossed into the land of Nephi and Lehi were quickly captured by a Lamanite

> army and thrown in jail. While imprisoned, they faced persecution from both the Lamanites and the Nephite dissenters. However, it was one of those dissenters who played a key role in the success of their missionary effort in the land of Nephi.

Aminadab, a Nephite Dissenter

After being jailed, Nephi and Lehi went without food for several days. At a time appointed by the Lamanites, a large number of men entered the prison, planning to take the lives of these Nephite missionaries. This group consisted of both Lamanites by birth and Nephite dissenters (Helaman 2:91 RLDS) [Helaman 5:27 LDS]. Among the

men who entered the prison that day was a man named Aminadab. He is identified as a Nephite who had once belonged to the church of God. (Helaman 2:99 RLDS) [Helaman 5:35 LDS]

Aminadab was one of many Nephites who abandoned the people of Nephi and became a part of the unbelieving Lamanite nation. These dissenters were people who had been members of the church of God. They had been baptized into the church. They had been taught the gospel and for awhile lived as Christians. But, after entering into a covenant with the Lord, they turned their backs on God and the church body. They became enemies of the church and the gospel. Alma and Amulek, in their missionary journeys many years earlier, had encountered a group of dissenters known as Zoramites. In this account is given a basic definition of a dissenter.

Now the Zoramites were dissenters from the Nephites; therefore they had the word of God preached unto them. But they had fallen into great errors, for they would not observe to keep the commandments of God, and his statutes, according to the Law of Moses; Neither would they observe the performances of the church, to continue in prayer and supplication to God daily, that they might not enter into temptation; yea, in fine, they did pervert the ways of the Lord in very many instances; therefore, for this cause, Alma and his brethren went into the land to preach the word unto them. (Alma 16:85-87 RLDS) [Alma 31:8-11 LDS]

Therefore, a dissenter, in The Book of Mormon, was a person who had heard the message of the gospel and failed to observe the requirements of the gospel covenant. The reader is never told why these people began to forsake their faith and, later, their nation. For many of these people, it was probably a gradual process fueled by a lack of diligence in keeping the performances of the church and the Lord's commandments.

They may never have developed more

than a distant and impersonal relationship with the Lord Jesus. They may have believed rumors and lies told by others which stressed their faith. They may have been hurt by the careless words of another and rejected the call to forgive. Whatever it may have been that started the freefall from the grace of God, it allowed them the opportunity to fall into the many snares of the devil.

Doubt and confusion about the truth they had been taught began to arise in their hearts, and they grew increasingly contentious. (3 Nephi 5:30 RLDS) [3 Nephi 11:29 LDS] Eventually, having lost the anchor and the rock of their faith, they were washed away into apostasy by the storms of the adversary which came upon them. Having been offered grace, they refused to live in grace, and they fell away into full rebellion against God.

If anyone persists in this kind of rebellion through the remainder of their days in this life, they are in danger of becoming the sons of perdition (Hebrews 6:4-6 IV) [Hebrews 6:4-6 KJV]. Dissenters forfeited their spiritual home and rejected the ministry of God's Spirit.

Now these dissenters, having the same instruction and the same information of the Nephites; yea, having been instructed in the same knowledge of the Lord; nevertheless, it is strange to relate, not long after their dissensions, they became more hardened and impenitent, and more wild, wicked and ferocious, than the Lamanites. (Alma 21:121 RLDS) [Alma 47:36 LDS]

The proof that dissenters had rejected the Holy Ghost is the fact that they shortly become more hardened than even the Lamanites. Luke recorded the words of Jesus about this phenomenon,

He that is not with me, is against me; and he who gathereth not with me, scattereth. When the unclean spirit is gone out of a man, it walketh through dry places, seeking rest; and finding none, it saith, I will return unto mine house whence I came out. And when it cometh, it findeth the house swept and garnished. Then goeth the evil spirit, and taketh seven other spirits more wicked than himself, and

they enter in, and dwell there; and the last end of that man is worse than the first. (Luke 11:24-27 IV)

[Luke 11:23-26 KJV]

These dissensions were damaging to the church and to the nation. They hurt the church by depleting the membership of the church and increasing the number of the enemies the church must face. (Mosiah 11:110 RLDS) [Mosiah 26:5 LDS] Likewise, the nation suffered because of the many instances in which the dissenters were able to stir the flames of hatred in the Lamanite

hearts and cause warfare to break out. The Amalekites, Zoramites and the children of the priests of Noah all did this. (Alma 20:15 RLDS) [Alma 43:13 LDS] There were other groups that had likewise done this. (Alma 21:120 RLDS) [Alma 47:35 LDS] In Nephi and Lehi's day, the dissenters had also caused a war.

Nephi and Lehi's testimony reveals that there is only one sure way to reclaim any dissenter. The only cure to the sin sickness of dissension is the pure and undiluted word of God applied liberally upon those who are sick. Helaman's sons had great success among the Lamanites and the many dissenters in the land of Zarahemla. Moroni writes that they did confound many of those dissenters who had gone over from the Nephites insomuch that they came forth and did confess their sins, and were baptized unto repentance, and immediately returned to the Nephites, to endeavor to repair unto them the wrongs which they had done. (Helaman 2:79 RLDS) [Helaman 5:17 LDS]

The details of Aminadab's story are not recorded. All we know is that he was once a member of God's church, and he cast it all away in favor of living as the Lamanites. This angry man would have become increasingly angry in his heart toward his former brethren in his exile. There can be no doubt that Aminadab was among those in the jail as a way to take revenge on those who had been so offensive to him in the past.

Aminadab

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Aminadab had known the gospel and had once experienced the power of God. Had he previously held a position of ministry in the priesthood? Regardless of what he had known, he had been living with the Lamanites for some time, continually putting down the memories of his early days in the church. Now all he wanted was to continue to believe that the Nephites and their religion, were harsh, unfair and ought to be destroyed.

On the day described in scripture, Aminadab found himself in the prison with other dissenters and a group of Lamanites. Their mission was to take the missionaries and put them to death. (Helaman 2:84 RLDS) [Helaman 5:22 LDS] This was his chance to exact a measure of revenge on those who represented bad memories of his previous life. Little did Aminadab know, that on that day, he would see and hear things he had never imagined possible. That which he despised would again become precious and sweet to his soul.



Lost Souls Recovered

Aminadab's plan was supernaturally interrupted by the sudden emergence of a ring of fire that completely surrounded the two Nephite brothers. His heart and those of his cohorts were filled with fear. Amazingly, the two Nephites were not affected by the fire, but inside Aminadab, the embers of faith in Jesus Christ were ignited again. Perhaps he thought of the testimonies he had heard of the miraculous escape of Alma and Amulek from the prison in Ammonihah by the power of God and the death of all their persecutors. He may have recalled the testimonies and sermons he had heard of the great power of God. His mind was filled with many thoughts, but he was, like his brethren,



paralyzed in amazement at the ring of fire.

He felt more like the prisoner at that moment than the Nephite captives as he heard the Nephite men begin to speak,

And it came to pass that Nephi and Lehi did stand forth, and began to speak unto them, saying, Fear not, for behold it is God that has shewn unto you this marvelous thing, in the which is shewn unto you, that ye can not lay your hands on us to slay us. (Helaman 2:89 RLDS) [Helaman 5:26 LDS]

Accompanying the testimony was a sudden and powerful shaking of the prison. It seemed as if the building would surely fall to the ground, but it did not. This was followed by the appearance of a dark cloud that settled upon Aminadab and the others. Then they heard a voice from heaven saying, "Repent ye, repent ye, and seek no more to destroy my servants which I have sent unto you to declare good tidings". (Helaman 2:93RLDS) [Helaman 5:29 LDS]

Again, Aminadab may have recalled the testimony of Alma as the angel appeared unto him while he was in rebellion. Alma had heard the angel warn him to stop seeking the destruction of the church of God. Now, in Aminadab's ears, he heard a voice of heaven saying essentially the same things.

The sound of the voice was followed by a shaking of the earth. Three times this happened. Three times the spirit of God penetrated the hard hearts of the Lamanites and the dissenting Nephites, including Aminadab.

The marvelous display of God's power began to break down all the barriers of unbelief that had been erected in Aminadab's heart. His spirit softened before the Lord and entertained again the truth that God is all-powerful. He must also have realized the Lord could have snuffed out their lives as he had killed the wicked in Ammonihah, but God was extending grace to him. He and his companions were being invited to repent! Perhaps he thought, "I can come back! God's love is again offered to me." Aminadab and the other "captors" were blinded by the cloud and frozen in their tracks from the fear of God which had gripped their souls. From the record, it appears that the men were in the same position they were in when the cloud appeared. They were in the hands of the living God, and they were powerless before him.

Aminadab, by the power of the faith given him and emboldened by the Spirit of God, was able to turn his head to see the men he had previously persecuted.

And it came to pass that he turned him about, and behold, he saw through the cloud of darkness the faces of Nephi and Lehi; and behold, they did shine exceedingly, even as the faces of angels. And he beheld that they did lift their eyes to heaven; and they were in the attitude as if talking or lifting their voices to some being whom they beheld. (Helaman 2:100,101 RLDS) [Helaman 5:36 LDS]

The events that took place next are a testament to the redeeming grace of God, who has been called "the God of second chances." Intelligence and wisdom was given to Aminadab. As he viewed Nephi and Lehi, he was given the ability to know they were speaking with angels. He was also given the commandment and privilege of joining with the labor of God and his servants by inviting his brethren to see what he was seeing.

Amazingly, God had chosen to use a once angry, wicked, traitor to the faith of God as a missionary in the midst of the people with whom he had committed many wile. A spin delt a solid shall we do, that this cloud of darkness may be removed from overshadowing us? (Helaman 2:102-106 RLDS) [Helaman 5:37-40 LDS]

In a scene that is reminiscent of the preaching of Peter and the disciples on the day of Pentecost, the crowd of men asked Aminadab, "What shall we do?" In Jerusalem, the Jews had asked, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37 IV) [Acts 2:37 KJV] Lamoni's father had asked, "What shall I do, that I may have this eternal life of which thou hast spoken?" (Alma 13:48 RLDS) [Alma 22:15 LDS] This is the question which the ministry of the Spirit causes to come to the heart and lips of those convinced of the truth of Jesus Christ. It is a question of faith. At this moment, the human heart is primed for repentance, and the seed of the word of God is nigh unto sprouting and taking root in the soul. Here, the servant of God must be led by the same Spirit which has been laboring in the heart of the inquirer. In each of these cases, the seeker heard the same answer and the only appropriate one.

And Aminadab said unto them, You must repent, and cry unto the voice, even until ye shall have faith in Christ, who was taught unto you by Alma, and Amulek, and Zeezrom; and when ye shall do this, the cloud of darkness shall be removed from overshadowing you. And it came to pass that they all did begin to cry unto the voice of him who had shook the earth; yea, they did cry even until the cloud of darkness was dispersed. (Helaman 2:107, 108 RLDS)

evils. Aminadab could have refused and hardened his heart, but in the face of the degree of power on display, he would likely have been stricken dead. Agency is still at work in the life of even the most hardened, until the Lord ceases to strive with man. Aminadab obeyed the voice of



the Lord and led one of the world's most amazing altar calls ever!

And it came to pass that this man did cry unto the multitude, that they might turn and look. And behold, there was power given unto them, that they did turn and look; and they did behold the faces of Nephi and Lehi. And they said unto the man, Behold, what doth all these thing mean? and who is it with whom these men do converse? Now the man's name was Aminadab. And Aminadab said unto them, They do converse with the angels of God. And it came to pass that the Lamanites said unto him, What [Helaman 5:41, 42 LDS] The cloud which surrounded them was a representation of the power of God. It testified of God's holiness and judgment. By this cloud, these men were warned and called to repentance. It is not known why God chose Aminadab to be the spokesman and not some other Nephite. Perhaps his heart was

softer than the others. For whatever reason, it was the wisdom of God and his sovereign power which placed Aminadab and Nephi and Lehi in the Lamanite prison on that day. King Lamoni and his father both led revivals among their people following their being overcome by the Spirit of God.

All of those men in the prison were freed from the cloud of judgment by the grace of God. It was all done because of their faith in Jesus Christ and their repentance, believing that their sins could be removed from them.



And it came to pass that there came a voice unto them, yea, a pleasant voice, as if it were a whisper, saying, Peace, peace be unto you, because of your faith in my well beloved, who was from the foundation of the world. (Helaman 2:112 RLDS) [Helaman 5:46 LDS]

Conclusion

Aminadab's testimony was vital to the success of Nephi and Lehi's mission. None of this took the Lord by surprise, but it probably startled Aminadab somewhat. However, it seems likely that he was struggling with the Spirit of God for quite some time prior to the events in the prison. Like Saul, he was likely "kicking against the pricks" of the Holy Ghost for awhile. In the prison, his unbelief was finally cast away, and he allied himself with the word of truth.

This is a story that ought to encourage everyone who feels they have fallen irretrievably from the Lord's grace and also help those with friends or relatives who appear to be lost. The power of the Lord's redemption is able to claim all who will repent. Many people who knew Aminadab probably wrote him off as a permanent loss to the church, but the Lord recovered him and used him as a part of a great revival in the Lamanite nation.

It is important to note that no event such as this happens independently. If Nephi and Lehi had failed to go into the land of Nephi, Aminadab may never have been renewed to faith. If Alma, Amulek and Zeezrom had never traveled and declared the gospel, Aminadab would never have had an introduction to the gospel.

By some accounts, Aminadab is a small player in the Book of Mormon story. In the written record, he appears and disappears in just a few verses. His influence seems nothing like that of Nephi or Alma. However, his contribution to the gospel is huge. He did, in the jail, just what the Lord asked of him. Furthermore, it appears that he served as a faithful witness of what he saw and heard, and therefore, of the gospel in the land of Nephi. (Helaman 2:114, 115 RLDS) [Helaman 5:49, 50 LDS] He became a witness for Christ. The church of God experienced great joy because of the many people who came to the Lord among the dissenters and the Lamanites. Aminadab could also rejoice in the salvation of souls that came about. From the account of Aminadab, we can all take courage in that even the smallest contribution to the cause of Christ that is performed in holiness of heart, by faith, is acceptable and pleasing to the Lord.

"And if it so be that you should labor all your days, in crying repentance unto this people, and bring save it be one soul unto me, how great shall be your joy with him in the kingdom of my Father! And now, if your joy will be great with one soul that you have brought unto me into the kingdom of my Father, how great will be your joy, if you should bring many souls unto me! (Section 16:3f, 4a RLDS) [Section 18:15, 16 LDS]

At some point in time, some faithful soul planted the seed of the gospel in the heart of Aminadab. He or she may never have known the fruitfulness of the word in his life, but God knows. The seed was planted and, although its growth was stunted for a number of years and the garden spot was overgrown with weeds and thorns, the Lord nourished the seed. We are asked to distribute the word liberally, and God oversees the watering and nourishment of the seed.

Aminadab's testimony and labor laid the foundation for one of the greatest Book of Mormon prophets, Samuel. Samuel the Lamanite would be sent to prophesy to the Nephites some 23 years later, revealing the signs of the birth and death of Jesus Christ, the Messiah. (Helaman 2:125; 5:1 RLDS) [Helaman 6:6; 13:1 LDS] Samuel's gospel heritage lay in the preaching of Lehi and Nephi and the repentance and obedience of a man named Aminadab.

Aminadab is a small character in the The Book of Mormon whose life illustrates what can go wrong in the life of man who was taught the gospel. He also illustrates the power and infinite mercy of God to restore a sinner to righteousness. How potent is the blood of the Lamb in washing away the sins of the world!

at his granddaughter. "I'm fixing this hole. What have you got there?"


"Grandma sent these peelings out to the chickens." Annie peered at his work.

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
