ONE MIGHTY AMONG THEM

And it shall come to pass, that there shall be a great work in the land...and the time speedily cometh that great things are to be shown forth unto the children of men;

(D&C 34:3a,d RLDS) [D&C 35:7,10 LDS]

ike many of you, I often consider the exciting day in which we live. In so doing, we realize that great things have come, now come, and will come upon the earth as the word of the Lord becomes reality before our eyes. It sometimes feels like a tidal wave of scriptural fulfillment has fallen upon the world, creating a relentless personal challenge to keep up with daily events and their relationship to the scriptures.

I'm constantly amazed how accurate we find the prophetic descriptions of this time called the latter day dispensation. It is a time also called the dispensation of the fullness of times. It's a time of great restoration, gathering, movement, fulfillment and revelation. A church elder recently shared with us that we can't do anything about yesterday, and we have to wait for tomorrow to come. However, today is the day we can choose to participate in this great and marvelous work. So today, we journey toward the climax of prophetic world events as God moves to complete His work and establish His kingdom on earth. It's sometimes overwhelming to consider such great events, but let's focus and examine just one of them in this article.

One of the most intriguing prophetic chapters in the Book of Mormon is 2 Nephi 2 (RLDS) [2 Nephi 3 LDS]. Few scriptural passages have been studied, speculated upon and discussed more than this chapter since publication of the Book of Mormon in 1830. Testimonies about this subject have abounded for generations, perhaps because of the powerful message it contains and the anticipation of its fulfillment in our lifetime. I remember, as a teenager, listening to such a testimony from a church sister in my home congregation and the exciting interest it inspired within me. It's not my intent to add to or take away from

these testimonies, but rather to allow the scriptures to speak their own testimony concerning this great thing. I believe we can experience an increase in our faith and hope for the future as we recognize this to be one example of the many great things coming upon the earth in the last days.

For our brief consideration, let's primarily investigate the four summary scriptures toward the end of 2 Nephi 2 (RLDS) [2 Nephi 3 LDS]. I also encourage you to engage in your own personal study of the whole chapter. The summary verses read:

And now, behold, my son *Joseph*, after this manner did my father of old prophesy.

Wherefore, because of this covenant thou art blessed: for thy seed shall not be destroyed, for they shall hearken unto the words of the book.

And there shall raise up **one mighty among them**, who shall *do much good*, both in *word and in deed*, being *an instrument in the hands of God*, with *exceeding faith*.

To work mighty wonders, and do that thing which is great in the sight of God, unto the bringing to pass much restoration unto the house of Israel, and unto the seed of thy brethren.

(2 Nephi 2:44-47 RLDS) [2 Nephi 3:22-24 LDS] (emphasis added)

This chapter contains the blessing given by Lehi to his youngest son, Joseph. It was bestowed upon him soon after reaching the Americas and over five centuries before the birth of Christ. Young Joseph was born in Lehi's "wilderness of affliction," which describes their difficult journey from



Jerusalem, through the Arabian Peninsula and eventually across the waters to the Promised Land. Joseph, like his older brother Nephi, grew up in obedience to the word of the Lord and was highly favored of his father and in the sight of God.

In this blessing, Joseph was first given an overview of the Lord's covenants previously placed upon their patriarchal father Joseph of Egypt. It's because of those covenants that the seed of young Joseph would be blessed in the latter days and a primary reason for which this blessing is given.

One of the important prophecies spoken by Lehi was that the seed of his son Joseph would not be destroyed. How do we know they were not destroyed? As we trace them through history, we should remember the Book of Mormon describes them as Josephites. Individual tribes were often identified by names associated with the name of their patriarchal father. For example, we encounter the first reference to Josephites about 40 years after this blessing was given. About 544 B.C. we read:

Now the people which were not Lamanites, were Nephites; nevertheless, they were called Nephites, Jacobites, *Josephites*, Zoramites, Lamanites, Lemuelites, and Ishmaelites.

But I, Jacob, shall not hereafter distinguish them by these names, but I shall call them Lamanites, that seek to destroy the people of Nephi; and those who are friendly to Nephi, I shall call Nephites, or the people of Nephi, according to the reigns of the kings. (Jacob 1:13-14 RLDS) [Jacob 1:13-14 LDS] (emphasis added)

Even though the general names of "Nephites" and "Lamanites" are often used in the Book of Mormon to identify the larger grouping of individual tribes, we also see individual tribal names periodically used to distinguish them from the larger body of people. For instance, several centuries after this blessing, we find another specific reference to Josephites following the ministry of Christ on this continent. Some scriptures from about 194 A.D. read:

And now it came to pass in this year, yea, in the two hundred and thirty and first year, there was a great division among the people.

And it came to pass that in this year there arose a people who were called the Nephites, and they were true believers in Christ; and among them there were those who were called by the Lamanites, Jacobites, and *Josephites*, and Zoramites;

Therefore the true believers in Christ, and the true worshipers of Christ, (among whom were the three disciples of Jesus who should tarry,) were called Nephites, and Jacobites, and Josephites, and Zoramites.

And it came to pass that they who rejected the gospel, were called Lamanites, and Lemuelites, and Ishmaelites; and they did not dwindle in unbelief, but they did wilfully rebel against the gospel of Christ; (4 Nephi 1:39-42 RLDS) [4 Nephi 1:35-38 LDS] (emphasis added)

The last reference to Josephites in the Book of Mormon is found in the final years of the Nephite nation and recorded in Mormon's writing. He inscribes these words on the plates about three centuries after Christ.

And it came to pass in this year, there began to be a war between the Nephites, who consisted of the Nephites and the Jacobites, and the *Josephites*, and the Zoramites; and this war was between the Nephites and the Lamanites, and the Lemuelites, and the Ishmaelites.

Now the Lamanites, and the Lemuelites, and the Ishmaelites were called Lamanites, and the two parties were Nephites and Lamanites.
(Mormon 1:8-9 RLDS) [Mormon 1:8-9 LDS] (emphasis added)

Thus, we see evidence the Josephites are still an existing and recognized tribe near the end of the Book of Mormon records. Consequently, Lehi's prophecy declaring that Joseph's seed would not be destroyed is supported throughout the 1,000-year Book of Mormon timeline of Nephite history.

Further, the definitive scripture showing the modern-day survival of Joseph's seed is found in latter-day revelation. It testifies of the truthfulness of Lehi's blessing to his youngest son, given well over two millenniums before. A revelation given in 1828 mentions the Josephites as one of the tribes from Lehi's seed who will receive promised blessings and participate in the great events of the Restoration. Taken together, we should be looking for the prophesied presence of Josephites in our day! We read:

Nevertheless, my work shall go forth, for, inasmuch as the knowledge of a Savior has come unto the world, through the testimony of the Jews, even so shall the knowledge of a Savior come unto my people, and to the Nephites, and the Jacobites, and the *Josephites*, and the Zoramites, through the testimony of their fathers;

and this testimony shall come to the knowledge of the Lamanites, and the Lemuelites, and the Ishmaelites, who dwindled in unbelief because of the iniquity of their fathers, whom the Lord has suffered to destroy their brethren the Nephites, because of their iniquities and their abominations;

and for this very purpose are these plates preserved which contain these records, that the promises of the Lord might be fulfilled, which he made to his people;

and that the Lamanites might come to the knowledge of their fathers, and that they might know the promises of the Lord,

and that they may believe the gospel and rely upon the merits of Jesus Christ, and be glorified through faith in his name, and that through their repentance they might be saved. Amen. (D&C 2:6a-e RLDS) [D&C 3:16-20 LDS] (emphasis added)

We can use a simple graphic timeline to see the consistent movement of scriptural references to the Josephites from the time of Lehi to the present.

along with other Book of Mormon peoples, might come to a knowledge of the covenants and of Jesus Christ as their savior through the testimony of their fathers.

If all the Josephites were not destroyed at Cumorah, then some obvious questions are: When did they leave? How did they leave? Where did they go? Where is the one mighty among them today? Right now we can only imagine the answers, but there are some reasonable possibilities not too far down the road of speculation.



We know that groups of people left the area on ships, and probably also over land, long before the final battle at Cumorah. We know they went

somewhere to the north. It's not difficult to think some also went to the south or to islands of the sea. They certainly went wherever the Lord led them. There could easily have been Josephites among any of these migrating groups, even though we don't know their exact make-up or final destination.

And it came to pass that Hagoth, he being an exceeding curious man, therefore he went forth, and built him an exceeding large ship, on the borders of the land Bountiful, by the land Desolation, and launched it forth into the west sea, by the narrow neck which *led into the land northward*. (Alma 30:6 RLDS) [Alma 63:5 LDS] (emphasis added)



We know that people tried to escape destruction and fled the area during the great turmoil and internal wars that surrounded the final battle at

Cumorah. Moroni tells us the Nephites were hunted down by the Lamanites and killed. However, this reference may have been a more general observation to describe the overall scene rather than a detailed account of every single individual's fate among large numbers of people. There could have been Josephites among those individuals who may have escaped.

And now it came to pass that after the great and tremendous battle at Cumorah, behold, the Nephites who had *escaped into the country southward*, were hunted by the Lamanites, until they were all

destroyed; and my father also was killed by them; and I, even remain alone to write the sad tale of the destruction of my people. (Mormon 4:2 RLD)
[Mormon 8:2 LDS]
(emphasis added)



Lehi told Joseph his seed would hearken unto the words of the book. We see, in the scripture just quoted, that is one of the reasons the plates were preserved, so the Josephites,



We know that some of the Nephites dissented over to the Lamanites and became part of their history even today. We are told that some joined

the Lamanites because certain destruction was upon them. There could have been Josephites among them.

And if it so be that they perish, we know that many of our brethren have dissented over unto the Lamanites, and many more will also dissent over unto them; (Moroni 9:25 RLDS) [Moroni 9:24 LDS] (emphasis added)

It's intriguing to consider that one or more of the three disciples of Christ who chose to tarry upon the earth until the end, could be Josephites.

Their names were not allowed to be recorded. Their specific tribal name is also not mentioned, but Restoration tradition has more commonly referred to them in general terms as the "three Nephites." This reference to them as Nephites may be true in the general sense, but may not be individually correct since the Nephites also included the Jacobites, Josephites, and Zoramites. I mention this as a possibility because the blessing to Joseph contains descriptive references to the purpose and ministry of the one mighty among them that seems to run parallel with the purpose and ministry of the "three Nephites." Also, both the mighty Josephite and the "three Nephites" will be present in the latter days, with each having the same calling to be involved in the restoration of the House of Israel. They both have the convincing power of God with them.

And it shall come to pass, when the Lord seeth fit in his wisdom, that they shall minister unto all the scattered tribes of Israel, and unto all nations, kindreds, tongues and people, and shall bring out of them unto Jesus many souls, that their desire may be fulfilled, and also because of the convincing power of God which is in them;

(3 Nephi 13:41 RLDS) [3 Nephi 28:29 LDS] (emphasis added)

It seems we have a lot of Josephs to remember and understand. On our current list is Joseph of Egypt, Joseph the son of Lehi and Joseph Smith Jr. The chart on the right shows the different lineages and reminds us that this descendant of young Joseph was not Joseph Smith Jr.

Lehi told his son, Joseph, that his seed would not only survive, but would hearken unto the words of the book. It's interesting the word "book" is not used elsewhere in this chapter to specifically identify the book being referenced. However, there are many verses in the chapter which seem to describe the book as being the Book of Mormon. We should also remember that other books will be coming forth in the latter days, which may add further application to this prophecy. The Lord said, in the latter days, He will gather his records in one from the other tribes of Israel and the nations of the earth. The records will come with the people as they gather to the lands of their inheritance.


And it shall come to pass that my people which are of the house of Israel, shall be gathered home unto the lands of their possessions; and my word also shall be gathered in one. (2 Nephi 12:73 RLDS) [2 Nephi 29:14 LDS]

(emphasis added)

What should we look for in the ministry of this mighty Josephite raised up in the latter days? The fruits of his ministry, with the testimony of the Holy Spirit, will confirm his identity to those who know and believe in the word of God. He will do much good in word and deed and be an instrument in the hands of God with exceeding faith. He will work mighty wonders and do that thing which is great in the sight of God. 2 Nephi 2:47 RLDS [2 Nephi 3:24 LDS] defines "that thing which is great in the sight of God" as bringing much restoration to the House of Israel and the seed of his brethren. The word "brethren" is important in this context since it differentiates his brethren, the Lamanites, from the other tribes of Israel throughout the world. Many times, the Book of Mormon prophets refer to their Lamanite cousins as their "brethren," even in times of war. An example of this is found in the words of Moroni:

And these things are written, that we may rid our garments of the blood of our brethren who have dwindled in unbelief.

(Mormon 4:101 RLDS) [Mormon 9:35 LDS] (emphasis added)



Who, then, is this mighty servant? By now, you may be expecting to read his name, address and phone number in this article. Personally, I haven't yet seen any person, within the realm of my observation, projecting the spiritual qualities and mighty works found in 2 Nephi 2 (RLDS) [2 Nephi 3 LDS]. However, without any doubt, we should expect that he is either already working somewhere or will be raised up

in some future time and place. Either way, his mission will be accomplished with powerful and convincing ministry that will have wondrous effects upon the people to whom he is sent. This should prompt us to remember that this great and marvelous work is a much larger picture than our current experience.

For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord.

For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are *my ways higher than your ways*, and *my thoughts than your thoughts*. (Isaiah 55:8-9 IV) [Isaiah 55:8-9 KJV] (emphasis added)

As we briefly consider further possibilities, we realize the mighty Josephite discussed in this article is but one example of other authoritative servants now working in the world outside our view. The scriptures specifically mention some of them such as apostle John and the "three Nephites." However, there may be others. We also know Jesus visited all the tribes of Israel and performed the same ministry among them. Their own records contain an added testimony of Christ's visit and ministry among them.

And I shall also speak unto the other tribes of the house of Israel, which I have led away, and they shall write it;

(2 Nephi 12:69 RLDS) [2 Nephi 29:12 LDS] (emphasis added)

And not at any time hath the Father given me commandment that I should tell it unto your brethren at Jerusalem;

neither at any time hath the Father given me commandment, that I should tell unto them concerning the *other tribes of the house of Israel*, whom the Father hath led away out of the land.

This much did the Father command me, that I should tell unto them, that *other sheep* I have, which are not of this fold; them also I must bring, and *they shall hear my voice*; and there shall be *one fold, and one shepherd*.

(3 Nephi 7:15-16 RLDS) [3 Nephi 15:14-17 LDS] (emphasis added)

It's reasonable to think these other tribes of Israel could have their own servants of Christ now working in the world or coming forth in the future. Perhaps they are immortals like the "three Nephites." Perhaps they are simply descendants of those who received blessings like the mighty Josephite in this article.

Regardless, it will be fascinating to observe the saints gather to the New Jerusalem from the four quarters of the earth. Saints whose faces we have never seen, having been baptized by servants of Christ whom we do not know, from places we have never been. It may challenge us to discern the revelation of God for guidance and to open our arms to His people who come among us.

yea, the word of the Lord concerning his church, established in the last days for the *restoration of his people*, as he has spoken by the mouth of his prophets, and for the *gathering of his Saints* to stand upon Mount Zion, which shall be the city New Jerusalem; (D&C 83:1b RLDS) [D&C 84:2 LDS] (emphasis added)

Today, the Spirit of God stirs within the hearts of the faithful as His word is being fulfilled. As it does, the words

Today, the Spirit of God stirs within the hearts of the faithful as His word is being fulfilled. As it does, the words of Jesus continue to admonish His children. He said to watch, pray always and be ready. He said to behold the leaves on the fig tree and see they are more tender and greener than ever before. He said to prepare for the great day of the Lord to come. Yes, get ready, there are great things coming upon the earth!

"Second Year" Internship Program

The Book of Mormon Foundation is developing a program that would give former interns another opportunity to serve, learn and witness together. Though we have always taken former interns with us on Internship trips out of the country, this program is planned solely for former interns. We met with former interns in January 2010 to assess interest and develop guidelines for the program. This program is for anyone who has been part of the BMF Internship since its beginning in 1992.

As a result of our meeting, the following will be the guidelines for this program:

- 1 Those who may participate will be former interns (and spouse if married).
- The program will consist of a 7–14 day trip, which could be planned for any time during the year. It will provide opportunities for continued learning, serving and witnessing in regard to the Book of Mormon.

As we stood at the dig site listening to the instructions for the day, the excitement was evident on the faces of six former interns, one spouse and two BMF staff. Participating in an archaeological dig in Book of Mormon lands was a dream come true. Once we learned how to recognize some of the things we might find, how to hold our trowels, and save the artifacts, we dug in with earnest! Light-hearted banter began about what we might find – a jade mask, a crystal head – but there was pure satisfaction in the pottery, stone tools, shells, etc. that we did find. We were digging in a Mayan home where a family had

lived over a thousand years ago. In three days of digging, the artifacts we found covered two picnic tables and two benches. We spent a day washing and cataloging them. This opportunity came as an invitation from Luisa Carrillo, an archaeology student at Galen University in Belize.

Before and after the dig, we had time to explore the area around San Ignacio in western Belize, near the border with Guatemala. The Internship has always gone to Corozal in northern Belize, so this trip gave us an opportunity to see a very different part of the country. We visited two amazing Mayan ruins, Caracol and Cahal Pech. Cahal Pech is on a hill overlooking San Ignacio, but Caracol is a two-hour drive on a rough road deep into the Chiquibul Forest

Reserve. Caana is the tallest structure at Caracol, and is the tallest building in Belize. The site is breathtaking. The earliest construction here dates back to 300 BC, so we couldn't help wondering who we might know through the pages of the Book of Mormon who also walked the paths we walked. Cahal Pech was first settled between 1200–1000 BC and abandoned around AD 800–900. Oh, if walls could talk! We could almost visualize those long ago people going about their daily routines in the plaza.

On the return trip from Caracol, there is a swimming area called Rio on Pools. It was a river partially blocked by huge boulders, making layers of pools and waterfalls. It was a wonderful, refreshing spot after the heat at Caracol. The other water adventure taken by the younger members of the group was cave tubing. Floating down a river through caves on inner tubes is very popular in this part of Belize.

The chemist in our group, Isaac, was interested in some plants and their medicinal properties, so



- Everyone who participates will be responsible for organizing a worship service to share about the trip experience once they return home.
- Participants are responsible for all of their trip expenses.
- The number of participants each year will be no more than eight former interns and two staff members.
- Former interns interested in taking a trip with this program will need to send a letter/e-mail of intent to the Foundation expressing a desire to go. They will then receive an application to complete and return, as well as an approximate cost for the trip.
- The 2011 trip is tentatively being planned for May to Beijing, China.

we took a walk along the medicine trail with our guidebooks telling us about the different plants and trees. Eldon and I thoroughly enjoyed traveling, working and worshiping with these wonderful people.

We hope this first "Second Year" trip is only the beginning of many more adventures for the Book of Mormon Foundation interns.

Prior to going to Belize, we fasted and prayed as a group for the trip. One of the things we prayed about was to have the opportunity to witness to the people we would meet on the trip. On Friday night, after checking into the guesthouse where we were to stay during the trip, I noticed a man sitting at the edge of the property. I thought it was odd that he was just sitting there all evening, but I did not think much about it. The next day, Eldon told us this man was the night guard. I decided to talk to him on our second night in Belize. The man's name was Róque. He stayed at our guesthouse from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. every day. The local children liked to talk to him, but when it got late, he mostly just sat outside and read a book. The next night, when we got back from eating dinner, Róque was there, so I went over to talk to him. I asked him what he was going to read that night, but he said he had forgotten his book. I immediately thought this was an opportunity to share God with Róque. I



went back to my room and got a book I had brought about a Chinese Christian who suffered much in his dedication to serve Christ. Róque eagerly began to read the book and finished it the last night we were in Belize. Each night, he would talk about what he was reading, and each time we talked, it brought the opportunity to talk about God. I found out that Róque believed in God, but did not go to church. Others in our group were able to talk to him and share with him about our faith in God. By the end of the week, Isaac gave him a Book of Mormon to read about Christ in America. I pray he will read the Scriptures and allow God to become an integral part of his life.

During our stay in San Ignacio, the guesthouse employed a night watchman. His name was Róque, and he was usually in a chair under a yard light with a book to help pass the time. Several members of our group would stop to chat with him or share something we couldn't finish at dinner. Brian loaned him a novel about a Christian in China, which he finished and returned before we left. Toward the end of the week, I was chatting with Róque after dinner. I told him we believe the Mayan legends of

a bearded white god. I said Jesus came to these lands to teach the same principles He taught in the Old World. Róque said he would be interested in reading the book that told about Jesus' visit. I gave him a pocketsized Book of Mormon, with a bookmark in III Nephi 5. It is my prayer that Róque can learn the good news Jesus personally brought to the people of this land so long ago.

The Belize trip gave me an appreciation for archaeology I could have never had without getting my hands dirty in the process of an excavation. I now look at excavated Mayan temples in awe of the work put into their construction, and also the thousands of man-hours it must have taken to rescue them from the jungle. In addition, it has given me a feel for the puzzle the archaeologists face when they uncover a building with its rubble and displaced stones.

On the second night of our trip, we were able to have supper with Celia, a Belizean woman who has coordinated service projects in Corozal for the Book of Mormon interns for the past eight years. She traveled two hours by bus to eat with us. After our meal, she presented us with gifts to welcome us to Belize again. We were amazed when she pulled out beautifully handcrafted pillowcases. Each pillowcase was embroidered with our birthday in the Mayan numerical system and monthly glyph. The stitching was exquisite, and the design covered most of the pillowcase's surface. She explained that she had recently learned to embroider, and she desired to make us a special gift when she learned we were coming again. 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
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
