Nephi, metallurgist extraordinaire

hroughout the scriptures we often find references to the occupations of various individuals, while others' temporal talents go unmentioned. Paul was a tent maker, Peter a fisherman, Joseph a carpenter and Simon a tanner. In the Book of Mormon, we learn that Zeezrom was a lawyer, Moroni a military officer, and Ammon is best known for his three-day temporary job as a shepherd.

But what of Lehi and Nephi? Although Nephi never specifically states an occupation, his detailed account leaves us with sufficient clues that we can make a strongly supportable hypothesis. After arriving in the land of promise, Nephi tells us that he taught his people to work in iron, copper, brass, steel, gold, silver, and precious ores (2 Nephi 5:15 LDS; 2 Nephi5:21 RCE). In my book, anybody capable of teaching someone else to mine the ore, smelt, refine, and produce fine metals such as steel, gold and silver has a high-level understanding of metallurgy that goes far beyond general knowledge or avocation. From this one verse alone, one would be justified in identifying Nephi as one of the great metallurgists of his time in the new world.

Since Nephi was perhaps only 14 or 15 years old when he left Jerusalem, it would be reasonable to hypothesize that Nephi acquired metalworking skills the way most young men of his time learned a trade: from his father. In Lehi's time, metalworking was a prestigious technical skill, one which could have reasonably supplied Lehi

with the prosperity attributed to him.

All of Nephi's references to metal-working are in the first person. In other words, he is not saying "the Nephites made plates of ore," or even "we made plates of ore," rather it is "I did make plates of ore." Metalworking was a skill and craft he

had developed and practiced on his own.

I am certainly not the first to propose that Lehi was a metalworker. John Tvedtnes, in a FARMS (Foundation for Ancient Research and Mormon Studies) study entitled "Was Lehi a Caravaneer?" suggests that "Lehi and his family were craftsmen and artisans—probably metalworkers." Tvedtnes believes that Lehi's occupation as a metalworker would readily explain Lehi's great wealth. He points to Biblical passages as well as to Assyrian and Babylonian documents of that era to evidence that craftsmen and smiths were considered to belong to the upper class. Nibley, in theorizing a possible occupation for Lehi, notes that "one did not acquire 'exceeding great riches' by running a shop in Jerusalem or a farm in the suburbs." (Approach to the Book of Mormon, p. 45)

To postulate that Lehi was a metalworker by trade explains why, while

living at Jerusalem, he had camels, tents, and provisions required for a quick departure into the wilderness. The most likely route for Lehi's departure would have taken him to the Red Sea via a rift valley called the Arava which runs between the Dead Sea and the Red Sea. This was an ancient trade route with which Lehi would have been familiar. As a metallurgist, Lehi would have gone to the area near Timna or King Solomon's mines for ore which he would have returned to Jerusalem by camel caravan. When Lehi departs Jerusalem and goes to the Red Sea, he is traveling in familiar territory. That is evident by his sons' readiness and ability to return to Jerusalem twice from the Valley of Lemuel. It's only after they have traveled a few days beyond this familiar source of ore and are ready to depart the Valley of Lemuel that they venture into unknown territory and have need for the liahona.

When Nephi and his three older brothers return to Jerusalem, they go first to the land of their inheritance to collect Lehi's inventory of gold, silver, and precious things left behind in their hasty exodus. They then use this wealth in an attempt to purchase the plates from Laban. After being chased into the wilderness by Laban's servants, Laman and Lemuel smite Nephi and Sam with a rod, which we imagine was done with clear intent to do bodily harm or at least to subject the younger siblings. Nephi doesn't say "they hit us with a stick" - something that probably would not have been very painful or threatening for someone of Nephi's large stature. Instead, they are smote with a "rod," (1 Nephi 3:28 LDS; 1 Nephi 1:92 RCE) presumably a metal rod which they would have carried as part of the inventory of Lehi's trade.


The prominence of the iron rod in Lehi's vision of the tree of life could also be cited as evidence of Lehi's occupation as a metalworker. Dreams, even prophetic dreams, have some basis in the day-to-day life experiences of the dreamer. That Lehi visualizes a rod of iron which leads to the fountain of living water or the tree of life is not coincidental.

Like any aspiring craftsman, young Nephi admired the quality workmanship of other artisans. He was fascinated with the sword of Laban, and described its workmanship and composition in great detail. He stated that "the hilt thereof was of pure gold, and the workmanship thereof was exceedingly fine, and I saw that the blade thereof was of the most precious steel." (1 Nephi 4:9 LDS; 1 Nephi 1:109 RCE)

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Upon arriving in the land of promise, Nephi used his metalworking expertise when he "did take the sword of Laban, and after the manner of it did make many swords." (2 Nephi 5:14 LDS; 2 Nephi 4:19 RCE)

When Nephi was commanded by the Lord to build a ship, his first and only question was where he should go to find the ore. (1 Nephi 17: 9 LDS; 1 Nephi 5:71) He was not concerned about how to make tools or nails; he already had the metalworking skills to accomplish that task. The Lord then showed him were the ore was located, and instructed him in the construction of the ship to carry his family to a land of promise.

Upon his arrival in the land of promise, the first thing Nephi mentions is the availability of plants and animals (food). After months at sea, that's not a surprising observation. But his next observation is not about the good soil, nice weather, or friendly neighbors; no, he goes into specifics about the type of ore they found: "And we did find all manner of ore, both of gold, and of silver, and of copper." (1 Nephi 18:25 LDS; 1 Nephi 5: 217 RCE) Nephi is a man who clearly knows his metal, where to find ore and how to refine it. He then set out to produce plates from the newfound source of ore. It was upon these plates that Nephi recorded the sacred history of his people.

Ultimately, we may be able to credit Nephi directly for much of the metal-lurgical expertise found throughout Mesoamerica. While civilizations to the north had access to ore, they never developed the metallurgical skills found in Mesoamerica. One can even wonder if without Nephi's skill as a metalworker, and his ability to teach that skill to subsequent generations, what we might have had in place of Mormon's gold plates.

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
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Names in the Bible and The Book of Mormon
